Area Council President, Mike Daly, is about to step down from his Presidential role in accordance with Vincentian policy that only permits a maximum 6-year term. During these past years, Mike has shown himself to be an excellent leader of the Society in Canterbury during a time when there were many 'ups n downs' as a result of Covid lockdowns but despite that has managed to keep the Society operating in a very balanced manner. Mike has always been a kind and caring leader and a colleague to those he has worked with in SSVDP. He always made time to acknowledge those who supported his work.

Maryanne Brown (Conference President in Kaiapoi) moved a vote of thanks to Mike at a recent Area Council meeting for his years of service as Area President. 'He was totally and always committed - very just, fair, and considerate in his decisions and always had the best interests of the Conferences and their futures at heart for the betterment of the Society long term. He's done a sterling job and will be sorely missed in this role.'

Mike's dedication to the Society has been impressive and has resulted in many positive results! How he has managed family work and Vinnies is mind boggling! Congratulations on an outstanding Presidency which of course, has been acknowledged by the National President appointing Mike to the National Board with his focus being on membership. This appointment recognises contribution and extensive understanding of the work of Vinnies. Over the years, Mike has developed close working relationships with other agencies with great expertise and respect. A great example is St John of God (Haurora Trust) where combined efforts have resulted in our Pavitt Street transitional housing project becoming a feasible project. The facilities should be completed by end of year and the tenants will be supported with wraparound services provided by the St John of God team based at Waipuna.

With Mike & Marianne away most of September (*travelling to Europe*), we will recognise Mike's very significant contribution to Vinnies at a function on his return in October '22.

Some of Mike's achievements during his time as President include-

- 2017 Implements new ZOHO Welfare system as part of our Vinnies tool kit. Meets with International President General Renato Lima de Oliveria at our Festival Day Organising President of the Societies 150-year celebrations held in Christchurch in October 2017
- 2018 Established a new retail shop in Hornby
- **2019** March, set up a fund for victims of Mosque attack Our rebuilt Papanui shop officially opened with a state of the art" op-shop
- **2020** Covid lockdown implements new procedures to facilitate the ongoing support of our clients
- 2021 New General Manager appointed Mike is invited to join National Board Stage 1 Pavitt Street project starts
- 2022 Pavitt St project Stage 2 commences due for completion and opening later this year New Conference Coordinator position established

Pavitt Street Special Housing Project

Ozanam Canterbury Charitable Trust

Pavitt Street Transitional Social Housing Units

Recent visitors to our shop in Stanmore Road may have noticed the housing construction that is currently taking place on the back of our shop. These are our seven transitional social housing units that are being constructed by the Ozanam Trust (established to oversee the development & management of these properties). Costing \$2.25million to build and furnish, the Society has undertaken a very successful fundraising campaign that despite a slow start, has recently borne fruit resulting in our targets now being close to our fundraising goal.

The Society has entered into an agreement with St John of God, Haurora Trust (SJOGHT) to provide secure, dry and warm housing to young mothers and their children – mostly homeless or in unsatisfactory accommodation situations. SJOGHT will provide wrap-around services (HOPE programme) to these families that will result in them acquiring the necessary life skills and confidence to move out to the private rental market when ready.



Construction is over 60% completed with an official opening of these units likely to take place later in the year. Delays due to the availability of gib has resulted in our builder Ashley de Wys having to use all his skills to minimise any delay in the delivery of this project.

In late August Olivia, our Youth and Young Adults' Development Officer, will be travelling to Vienna, Austria to pursue a short internship with the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA). In 2020, the IAEA established a Marie Sklodowska-Curie Fellowship Programme (MSCFP) which aims to support an inclusive workforce by increasing women in the field. The scholarship named after Marie Sklodowska-Curie, a winner of two Nobel Prizes in Physics and Chemistry, aims to inspire young, motivated women to pursue careers in the nuclear field. Out of an application pool of over 550, Olivia is one of the first 100 women globally to be awarded an MSCFP scholarship. Since the completion of her master's research titled, 'Seventy-five Years on: An Ethnographic Exploration of Oral Histories on the Atomic Bombing of Hiroshima,' Olivia has remained in contact with her research participants and has continued to speak out for peace and disarmament.

This year, Olivia has been given the opportunity to pursue an internship with the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna, Austria, and will be a part of the Safeguards Team working on two projects for the duration of her stay. She is looking forward to flying across the world to participate in this new and exciting journey. Olivia even managed to rent an apartment across the road from a Catholic church and hopes to meet other Vincentians overseas!


ST VINCENT DE PAUL

At the beginning of May 2021 there was a visit to Lincoln by Mike Daly, John Bell, and Penny Marks, outlining the aims of the Society and gauging interest in forming a conference. The result was that by June there was an embryo Selwyn parish conference. It is just over 13 months since then, and in that time we have established our fully functioning St Teresa of Calcutta Conference of the Society of St Vincent de Paul. We have a bank account, web page, dedicated phone line, posters, business cards, and an active and talented group of Vincentians. From the earliest days we started helping people. Our first big project was our Christmas Hamper appeal. Our parish communities responded in an overwhelmingly generous way and we were able to make Christmas a bit easier for about 28 families. Since then requests for help have steadily increased.

Our conference is in an interesting situation. We have a huge district that goes from the Rakaia River to the city boundary and from Arthur's Pass to Te Waihora, encompassing many rural/urban centres including Springfield, Sheffield, Darfield, Hororata, Leeston, Southbridge, Springston, Rolleston, Lincoln, and Prebbleton. Distances are large, bringing their own challenges for us in meeting each other and meeting the requests from the needy, especially for those away from the major urban areas of our district. One big issue is a lack of storage space, as it is not practical to be supplied by Stanmore Road for many things.

Our conference is small, with about 15 active participants, who give so generously of their time. It is growing steadily, and we are very fortunate to have so many young, talented, and very committed members in our group.

The environment has not been the easiest in which to start our conference. We have not known what it is like to operate without the presence of Covid in our community, but, by the grace of God, and with the support of all the Vincentian community, and Mike Daly, John Bell, and Penny Marks in particular, we got off to a good start. We are in our second year now, and look forward to improving our relationships with God, each other, and the people we help.

A NEW FOOD SHED

For Catholic Cathedral Conference



Our Cathedral Conference has recently commissioned a repurposed space on site at the Pro Cathedral complex in Manchester Street.

The new facility was blessed by Fr Simon and will free up space preciously taken inside the Pro Cathedral, and will help our operations teams in developing a more effective food storage and work area to assemble Kai (food) packs for delivery to those in need.

Cathedral Conference now meets as a single conference but retains for now two operational bases – one in Innes road Mairehau in the St Francis of Assisi School, and the other in the Manchester Street Cathedral complex. Teams work from both operations bases and deliver food and other assistance to a wide area of the central and North Western areas of Christchurch.
